# **New Assembly Format**

Now that our building work is complete, we have all our classroom spaces back and good access around the school site as well as into the school hall, we are eager to implement a new assembly programme.

Starting from next week, there will now be two types of assembly:

### FORMAL AWARDS ASSEMBLIES

There will be 6 full school Formal Awards Assemblies per year. These will be held on a Friday at 9.45am as per the schedule below.

Awards at these assemblies are focussed on our Learner Attributes (resilience, collaboration, creativity, curiosity) and there will be just 1 award per year level per category at each assembly. Parents of award winners will be invited, by email, to attend the assembly.

At each Formal Awards Assembly, we hope to have our Kapa Haka group perform as well as whole school singing, an address from Michael Maher and at least one other item which could be a guest speaker, musical showcase, video presentation, student speech, etc.

# **REGULAR AWARDS ASSEMBLIES**

There will be 10 Junior and 10 Senior Regular Awards Assemblies per year as per the schedule below.

- Junior Assemblies (Year 0 − 3) − held on a Friday at 9.45am
- Senior Assemblies (Year 4 8) held on a Friday at 11.45am

All students will receive an award at one of the Regular Awards Assemblies throughout the year. These awards are given out for anything of merit for each individual student. Parents of award winners will be invited to attend the assembly by Classroom Teachers.

Each learning space will 'host' one assembly per year. Hosting enables students to share their recent learning with a wider audience. Parents of host learning spaces will be invited to attend the assembly as well as the shared morning tea (Junior) or shared lunch (Senior) that will immediately follow the assembly.

# Cybersafety – Do you know what your child gets up to online?

Schools regularly receive communication from concerned parents expressing their distress over online bullying or friendship issues that are affecting their child. Usually, these incidents occur out of school hours (at home) and on social media platforms.

St Thomas's School's WIFI network is managed by N4L (Network for Learning) which ensures access to social media sites is blocked and inappropriate content is filtered. Despite these efforts, with increasing frequency we see students using their own data allowance to access content from personal devices brought to school.

While student wellbeing is a major focus for schools, it is very difficult to unpack these issues because of the nature of social media, the devices being personally owned, and the issues happening while students are at home, usually in the evenings or over the weekend. Additional to this, it is important for all parents to be aware, that the minimum age to open an account on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Pinterest, TikTok and Snapchat is 13. YouTube requires account holders to be 18, however a 13-year-old can sign up with a parent's permission.

Most primary school children will only turn 13 at the end of their Year 8 year. However, schools are seeing serious issues with students in year levels as young as Year 4.

As a parent, if you choose to allow your child to engage via social media before they are 13 years old, it is vital that you have complete visibility over what they get up to online. It is also important that you take responsibility for teaching your children how to manage themselves online and what to do should issues arise. Agreeing on rules and guidelines for internet and app usage is a good idea.

The fall-out from online incidents and general social media issues, including cyberbullying, inappropriate and late night messaging, drastically impacts teaching and learning time within most schools.

To work together as a team towards online safety, parents are encouraged to consider how the issues mentioned might affect their families. Netsafe has put together the following tips for parents and whānau to begin the conversation.

### **SEVEN STEPS TO HELP YOU**

The seven steps from Netsafe's Online Safety Parent Toolkit are designed to enhance your digital parenting knowledge and have been developed with parents in mind.

- 1. <u>Understand</u>: Read about the potential online risks, challenges and sometimes illegal behaviour young people face to understand what may happen
- 2. <u>Learn:</u> Ask your child about what they do, how they use devices and who they talk to learn about their activities. Check in regularly to see what has changed
- 3. **Explore:** Take the time yourself to explore the sites, apps and technologies your child uses to improve your knowledge and understand their experience
- 4. Agree: Create a family code with your child to agree on what they can do online including sites to visit, appropriate behaviours, privacy settings and limits
- 5. <u>Teach:</u> Recognise each child has unique needs, but some online safety concepts are universal. Start by teaching yours the Five tips to help your child thrive
- 6. <u>Model:</u> Be a good example to your child. Make sure you role model the sort of behaviours you want to see your child use online and offline
- 7. Plan: Make a plan so everybody knows what to do if something goes wrong and where you will be able to get advice and support in challenging times

# **Reporting Student Absences**

We would like to remind all parents/caregivers that reporting absences is important for the safety and wellbeing of students.

We aim to deal with all unexplained absences as quickly as possible each morning.

To minimise the number of unexplained absences, it is helpful if parents/caregivers take a few moments to advise the school of an absence in one the following ways:

- Through our Hero App (preferred)
- By telephone and leave a message 09 5283938 select option 1
- Text message to 0277580542

# It is not necessary to email the class teacher.

Absences must be reported each day, unless the office has been advised in advance of the duration of an absence. You must state the reason for absence i.e. sick, doctor's appointment, holiday or bereavement.

Any students arriving late to school must report to the office and sign in, so that their safe arrival can be recorded. Please note all late arrivals are recorded, should your child be late on a regular basis follow up action will be taken.

Please note that while we may try several alternative phone numbers to contact a parent/caregiver, if calls are not answered, where possible we will leave a voice message. If your phone numbers change, whether it is a work, home or mobile number, can you please advise the office.

Should you wish to collect your child early from school, please come to the office and sign your child out. Please note: we do not let your children go home with someone that is not on the child's record card. Students cannot be signed out during morning break or lunchtime so if they have an appointment, please pick them up before morning break (10.30am - 10.50am) and lunch (12.30pm - 1.30pm).

If you child is unwell during the school day, they should go to sick bay. They must **not** phone or text their parents/caregivers themselves.

# Nathan Wallis – The Developing Brain

On Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> May, Nathan Wallis – Neuroscience Educator, visited St Thomas's School to address the community with his Developing Brain presentation. Nathan's presentation was a sell out and it was fantastic to see so many of our parent community there to listen to Nathan sharing his expertise on child development and the practical implications of the last 30 years of research into the workings of the human brain.

Throughout the presentation, there were lots of tips and tricks to make parenting easier, to help open up communication with children in a way that encourages them to listen, develop and grow, why we have a growing epidemic of highly anxious children and how to grow resilience in our young people to counter this anxiety and successfully navigate life's challenges.


# OLYMPIC A-THON


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
