On our Teacher Only Day when our school site was closed to students, we had 16 cubic metres of wood chip delivered and spread across our Learning Through Play area behind rooms J13 and J14. The wood chip has provided a dry base for our young students to walk on in wet weather and we are now introducing different elements to support the students in creative and collaborative Learning Through Play. Red wood logs, an interactive water feature, wooden planks, tyres and vegetable planting boxes are now in place, and we are waiting for a mud kitchen to arrive.

The development of this interactive, participatory, multisensory environment supports play as a core activity in a child's development. Attaining key content and facts is important for school and life, but children also need a deep, conceptual understanding that allows them to connect concepts and skills, apply their knowledge to different situations, and spark new ideas. Our young students are incredibly inventive in their approach to Learning Through Play and are now looking to build bird feeders and insect houses as they explore the natural world.

A big thank you to our Property Manager, Glen, for all the work he has put into this space including installing vegetable boxes and safety fencing.

Hero Parent Reporting System

We are delighted to launch our new parent reporting system through our existing communications app, Hero. Your child's progress to date in 2021 is available from now, and further progress will be available, live and in real-time, ongoing.

Hero parent reporting is an online environment that reflects our unique context and local curriculum including our St Thomas's School Learning Progressions. It enables teachers and families to view content anytime, anywhere on any device. The software is secure, easy to use and brings together all school-related information in one place.

We are excited about the features that our new parent reporting system has to offer you:

- read posts and personalised comments relating to your child's learning
- view information on your child's progress and learning goals
- read notices sent to the class or groups your child is part of
- respond to school notices such as surveys and trip permission requests
- view school term dates
- view a school calendar of events
- notify the school if your child is absent or late
- navigate to other school-related web pages

Going forward, goal setting, St Thomas's School Learning Progressions achievement, effort ratings, St Thomas's School Learner Attribute assessments and personalised student comments will form an online report designed to build year on year so that over time you will have access to a range of information relevant to your child's learning all in one place.

We encourage you to log into your existing Hero app and have a look at the reporting information that is now available for your child/children.

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Keeping Ourselves Safe Parent Information Evening

To start Term 3 off every teacher will be delivering the Keeping Ourselves Safe Programme to their students. This programme will be delivered in weeks 1-3.

On Thursday 1st July at 6.30pm in the staff room our Community Constable, Gordon Campbell, will be running a Parent Information Evening where he will talk through the key themes of the programme and answer any questions parents may have.

Below is an outline of what is covered and what your involvement is as a parent.

What will children and young people learn?

They will learn:

- To work out when their safety is at risk.
- How to keep safe when they meet and mix with other people.
- Who and how to ask for help if they, or someone they know, is being abused.
- To go on asking for help until someone does something to stop the abuse.
- That it is important to make and follow personal, family and school safety rules.

They will know:

- That abuse is never okay.
- That abuse is never their fault.

What part do parents, caregivers and whānau play?

Parents and whānau are strongly encouraged to support Keeping Ourselves Safe.

- You can attend a meeting at school to tell you more about Keeping Ourselves Safe.
- You can find out about abuse and what to do if you think a child, you know is being abused.
- You can talk to your child about what they have learnt in Keeping Ourselves Safe.
- You can set safety guidelines with your family.
- You can help young children with the Keeping Ourselves Safe activities they bring home.
- You can give the same safety messages as the school is giving.
