
It is important for families to have a backup plan if their child is home for a period of time and especially important that students who are sick are not sent to school as it puts all the other children and teachers at risk.

Cybersafety – Do you know what your child gets up to online?

Schools regularly receive communication from concerned parents expressing their distress over online content or friendship issues that are affecting their child. Usually, these incidents occur out of school hours (at home) and on social media platforms.

St Thomas's School's WIFI network is managed by N4L (Network for Learning) which ensures access to social media sites is blocked and inappropriate content is filtered. Despite these efforts, with increasing frequency we see students using their own data allowance to access content from personal devices brought to school.

While student wellbeing is a major focus for schools, it is very difficult to unpack these issues because of the nature of social media, the devices being personally owned, and the issues happening while students are at home, usually in the evenings or over the weekend. Additional to this, it is important for all parents to be aware, that the minimum age to open an account on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Pinterest, TikTok and Snapchat is 13. YouTube requires account holders to be 18, however a 13-year-old can sign up with a parent's permission.

Most primary school children will only turn 13 at the end of their Year 8 year. However, schools are seeing serious issues with students in year levels as young as Year 4.

As a parent, if you choose to allow your child to engage via social media before they are 13 years old, it is vital that you have complete visibility over what they get up to online. It is also important that you take responsibility for teaching your children how to manage themselves online and what to do should issues arise. Agreeing on rules and quidelines for internet and app usage is a good idea.

The fall-out from online incidents and general social media issues, including cyberbullying, inappropriate and late night messaging, drastically impacts teaching and learning time within most schools.

We have recently had Constable Gordon in to talk to our senior students about Cybersaftety and the responsibilities of being online. We appreciate the support from parents and caregivers to reinforce this message.

To work together as a team towards online safety, parents are encouraged to consider how the issues mentioned might affect their families. Netsafe has put together the following tips for parents and whānau to begin the conversation.

SEVEN STEPS TO HELP YOU

The seven steps from Netsafe's Online Safety Parent Toolkit are designed to enhance your digital parenting knowledge and have been developed with parents in mind.

- 1. <u>Understand</u>: Read about the potential online risks, challenges and sometimes illegal behaviour young people face to understand what may happen
- 2. <u>Learn:</u> Ask your child about what they do, how they use devices and who they talk to learn about their activities. Check in regularly to see what has changed
- 3. **Explore:** Take the time yourself to explore the sites, apps and technologies your child uses to improve your knowledge and understand their experience
- 4. Agree: Create a family code with your child to agree on what they can do online including sites to visit, appropriate behaviours, privacy settings and limits
- 5. <u>Teach:</u> Recognise each child has unique needs, but some online safety concepts are universal. Start by teaching yours the Five tips to help your child thrive
- 6. <u>Model:</u> Be a good example to your child. Make sure you role model the sort of behaviours you want to see your child use online and offline
- 7. Plan: Make a plan so everybody knows what to do if something goes wrong and where you will be able to get advice and support in challenging times

This term Mandy is working with our teams on three different topics:
 - Saving the Great Barrier Reef using synthetically grown coral (Years 5&6)
 - o Saving the Orangutans in Sumatra with the help of drones (Year 7)
 - o Effects of illegally imported e-waste into Lagos, Nigeria (Year 8)
- Our Year 5 Team Leader, Nicky King (M6 KI), heads up our PB4L team who have been working hard to get PB4L initiatives up and running in the school. In Term 1, we had a very successful focus on manners and we all noticed the improvement in our students' Tikanga Pai as a result. This term Nicky is leading the PB4L team in implementing a focus on our school values Respect, Resilience and Responsibility. This new initiative sees students gathering house points tokens which will be cashed in by the winning house for a special mufti day just for them! Students are also looking forward to a school-wide afternoon of activities when our whole school target of 100,000 house points is reached.

Winter Illnesses and Staff Shortages

As we come into the winter months and cold/flu bugs become more prevalent, it is likely that we could experience staff shortages as many other schools already have.

In the event of a number of classroom teachers being absent, the leadership team works through a process to keep the school operating as normally as possible. Our priority is to avoid classroom and/or school closures and measures taken may include:

- Relief teachers in classrooms as would normally happen when a staff member is sick
- In the event of a reliever shortage using our non-classroom teachers such as our SENCo, literacy support teachers, ESOL teachers and STEAM teachers to take over classrooms until teachers return
- In the event of insufficient suitable staff being available:
 - o Splitting classes across a year level
 - Using staff in shared spaces (Years 4-8 only) to 'monitor' both classes
 - Closing individual classes or year levels
- In the event of widespread prolonged staff absences closing the school

The above measures will be rolled out in a scaled manner depending on the situation we find ourselves in. Closing the school will obviously be a last resort and will only be considered after we have exhausted all our resources and/or our low staffing levels have become a health and safety concern for our students and a risk for our staff to manage.


